Australian data suggests that this diagnosis is becoming increasingly common. Under-recognised by health practitioners, the accurate diagnosis of YOD is often a slow process. Frequently there is an atypical presentation, with cognitive, behavioural and/or motor signs and the needs of this group and their supporters are markedly different to older people with dementia. Dr Withall will present data from the NHMRC-funded INSPIRED Study, which is using a mixed methods design to improve service delivery for early onset memory and related disorders.
